Course Description

This writing-intensive course prepares students for college-level writing and introduces American literature. Students will write for various audiences and purposes and will read both fiction and nonfiction, analyzing writers' rhetorical styles. The course is recommended for students planning to enroll in AP Literature their senior year, and passing the AP exam earns a writing credit that most colleges require for all students.

Grading

Points shall be awarded for assignments, quizzes, and tests. Points will be awarded and collected cumulatively throughout the year. The final exam will be 10% of the course grade.
