#### **Syllabus English 11 RCHS**

## **RCAS Policies/Procedures**

### **Course Description**

English 11 is split into two parts, A & B.

English 11A explores Literature from American Authors and analyzes literary themes and ideas. 11A is focused on plays, speeches, poetry, and journalism and their relevance to the period during which they were created.

English 11B explores Literature from American Authors and analyzes literary themes and ideas. 11B begins with pre-European oral traditions and works its way through the American literary movements to present day. Composition, research, and the writing process will be heavy components of this course.

- I will write to inform and explain complex ideas and concepts clearly and accurately by selecting, organizing, and analyzing content. (W2)
- I will write clearly and in a manner that is appropriate to the assignment and audience. (W4)
- I will plan, revise, edit, and rewrite with the intent to strengthen and develop writing. (W5)
- I will research subjects with the intent to answer a question or solve a problem; broaden or focus the work accordingly, and use multiple sources to show understanding of the subject. (W7)

- I will determine the strengths and weaknesses of an information source based on the assignment, purpose, and audience; and use this information while avoiding plagiarism and overreliance on any one source. (W8)
