# **Essential Questions**

- Were the colonists justified in resisting British policies after the French and Indian War?
- Was the American War for Independence [choose one: a revolt against taxes, inevitable]?
- Could the Constitution be written without compromise?
- How did political parties evolve?
- Was the Age of Jackson an age of democracy?
- Should the states have the right to ignore the laws of the national government?
- Does a geographic minority have the right to ignore the laws of a national majority?
- Can legislative compromises solve moral issues?
- Can the Supreme Court settle moral issues? (Dred Scott decision)
- Was slavery the primary cause of the Civil War?
- Was the Civil War inevitable

# **Essential Learning Intentions**

- Students can summarize how the wars and their outcomes changed the relationship between Britain and the colonies.
- Students can explain the colonist reaction and protests to new taxes implemented by Great Britain.
- Students can assess why Congress declared independence, and the ideas underlying the Declaration of Independence.
- Students can explain the need for the Constitutional Convention, and describe the compromises made to create the Constitution
- Students can explain how a 2-party system emerged in the new nation.

- Students can explain how territorial expansion brought Americans into conflict with the British and Native Americans
- Students can explain the causes, key events, and impact of the War of 1812.
- Students can analyze the movement toward greater democracy under Andrew Jackson.
- Students can summarize the causes and effects of the removal of Native Americans in the early 1800s.
- Students can explain the concept of Manifest Destiny and how it influenced western expansion.
- Students can explain how the Second Great Awakening affecting the United States.
- Students can explain how the Abolitionist Movement created division within American Society.
- Students can analyze why slavery in the territories was a divisive issue between North and South and how Congress tried to settle the issue in 1850.
- Compare and contrast the positions of Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas on the issue of slavery.
- Students can analyze why the southern states seceded from the Union.
- Analyze why Lincoln decided to issue the Emancipation Proclamation and what is achieved.
- Assess the impact of the Civil War on the North and the South.
- Students can explain the multiple reasons why a plan was needed for Reconstruction of the South.
- Students can explain the successes and failures of Reconstruction.
