<u>ELA 9RB</u>

<u>Course Description</u>: English 9RB is a quarter-long course satisfying the second half of the ninth-grade English requirement. This course includes all standards in the first semester of the pacing guide. These include reading, writing, and speaking/listening & language strands in an integrated approach. English 9 is required for all ninth-grade students.

<u>Attendance:</u> Students are required to be in school every day. Students are responsible for communicating with their teachers to make up for missed learning.

Essential Skills:

I can effectively write for an appropriate audience with improving conventions. I can comprehend and respond to verbal communication and speech with an intended purpose. I can comprehend, evaluate, and analyze a grade-level text.

<u>Course Expectations:</u> Although not everything is graded, everything is important. To demonstrate growth and learning, students will need to:

- 1. Participate in class activities (take notes, work in a group, complete in-class tasks, ask questions) without distractions (cell phones, earbuds, games, etc.)
- 2. Use morning time and the teacher to seek help outside of class when needed.
- 3. Complete all assessments within teacher timelines.
- 4. Follow class/Eagles' Path expectations.
