

# <u>Drama 2</u>

<u>Course Description</u>: This class is a **HISTORICAL view of Theatre** with participation in group history projects, plays and performances.

Discover what theatre history is, learn new terminology, engage in reading plays that relate to a specific time period, create interesting short plays and storytelling, develop your voice and body movement, and understand the history behind it all!

- In Drama 2 we will study, create, and perform in these areas:
  - Greek Theatre w/creative project
  - Roman Theatre History w/creative project
  - Medieval Theatre History w/creative project
  - Renaissance Theatre History w/creative project
  - This semester's Acting Recital
- For the units listed above, students will be graded on the following state standard categories:
  - Connecting: introductory information, lessons, examples, worksheets, history & vocabulary
  - Creating: writing, planning, rehearsing, teamwork
  - Performing: workshops, performances, projects
  - Responding: discussions, quizzes, tests
- Theatre is a **collaborative effort**.
  - It takes *many people working together* to make theatre successful. Onstage, backstage and FOH.
- The drama room and the theatre department are a safe haven for all who enter.
   We accept everyone and respect his or her differences.
- This class will be fun and challenging.
  - My expectations of you as a theatre student are higher than in Drama 1.

<u>Attendance</u>: Students are required to be in school every day. Students are responsible for communicating with their teachers to make up missed learning.

Essential Skills: Participate, Collaborate, Communicate, Create.

<u>Course Expectations:</u> Although not everything is graded, everything is important. In order to demonstrate growth and learning, students will need to:

- 1. Participate in class activities (take notes, work in a group, complete in class tasks, ask questions) without distractions (cell phones, games, etc.)
- 2. Use morning time and teacher to seek help outside of class when needed.
- 3. Complete all assessments (or rehearsals and performances) within teacher timelines.

4. Theatre, by definition, cannot exist without the experience of a live audience. Your participation in this class is essential to this live experience. Demonstrating these skills to a captive audience is a crucial piece of evidence in the successful completion of this course and the earning of a grade.
